AN INTERVIEW WITH A JUMPRO

We recently conducted an interview with a successful deployed female JUMPro, Angela. We hope that the answers she provided below will offer valuable insights.

How did you initially begin your journey into the tech industry?

My journey started when I entered college. Ever since I was young, I was always very curious about technology and how things worked. It was my father who encouraged me to take on studying computer science. He believed that I had the characteristics to enjoy learning it, being that I was a critical thinker and a knowledge junkie. When I started my journey, I was excited but nervous at the same time. Although I familiarized myself with what I am about to study and know how to utilize basic day-to-day technologies, I had no idea if I was capable to learn such intensive skills. All I knew was that I was interested. In fact, I had no prior experience in coding, which made me even me even more nervous because I expected all my other colleagues to be experts. I was proven wrong once I did start. Most of the students were just like me, who has little to no experience of coding. I came to realize that it wasn't just about knowing how to code, but also knowing how to apply the theories we were learning. As years of my studying went by I got more interested and would look up more learnings on things I was most interested about outside of school.



How would you describe the influence JUMP has had on your career?

Cliche to say, but JUMP has definitely "jump-started" my career. Coming straight out of college during a pandemic, job hunting was extremely difficult at the time, especially with such little experience and projects. JUMP gave me hope that I could really attain a job in the tech field. I was able to apply everything I had learned, practically put obtained knowledge into action, and learn more through it all. Joining JUMP has also encouraged me to continue studying even after my degree completion because that is what the tech industry is all about. Through JUMP, I am able to get the experience I need to grow in my tech career.

Has there been any significant success stories or challenges you faced while working on-site, and how have you overcame them?

I don't have one specific story but whenever I would face challenges at work, I would feel overwhelmed with the work I have to finish before the end of the sprint. Most of the time I feel the pressure to complete a story/task at a specific time. In times like this, I usually take a deep breathe and a break for a couple minutes. As soon as I come back, I list out all of the things I need to get done in specific details, and give myself little hourly due dates for the day or even the week. They are never 100% completed by the time I want them to be, but I try not to be hard on myself, because the more I panic, the more I wouldn't get them done. Sometimes we spend more time worrying about completing things than actually spending time completing them. Despite all the challenges, we will always overcome them one way or another as long as we never give up. These challenges become our success stories eventually.



Is there advice you would like to offer to future JUMPro's or perhaps some wisdom you would impart to your younger self?

My biggest advice is to continue learning more and create different projects, no matter how big or small. Never be scare to explore the unknowns. The more you know, the better. On that note, never be afraid to ask any questions, even if you think they are "dumb". It's those questions that spark more of your curiosity and knowledge. I know that these are very common tech-career advices, but I'd like to say one more non career oriented advice. Most importantly I'd like to remind everyone, not just JUMPros, to believe in yourself and be kind to yourself. You should always be your number one fan. As long as you put your mind into what you want, you can achieve it. Yet, don't be too hard on yourself when things are not how you want them to be. Everything has a purpose in life, it is greater than what you might think it is. There's a rainbow always after the rain.
